Voting and Registration

Who can register to vote? Anyone who is a US Citizen, will be at least 18 years old by November 4, and who has lived in Wake County for at least 30 days can register to vote.

Registering to vote. October 10 is the last day to register or change your address to vote on Election Day, November 4. Your voter registration form must be postmarked by or hand delivered to the Board of Elections by October 10. After October 10th, use Same Day Registration.

Same Day Registration is for early voting only. During Early Voting, eligible Wake County residents can register and vote at any Early Voting site in Wake County.

For Same Day Registration and Voting, you just:

- Fill out a voter registration form.
- Show the elections official appropriate proof of residency, such as a form of identification with your current name and current address. If you cannot supply an acceptable form of identification, your registration application cannot be fully processed until the required information is provided.
- Vote while you are there or by November 1st. If you have used Same Day Registration you won't be able to vote on Election Day, November 4th.

Please verify your voter registration by October 25. Call the Wake County Board of Elections at 919-856-6240 or visit wakevotesearly.com to verify your registration. If you are not listed correctly, call the Board of Elections or go to an Early Voting site to make the changes by November 1st.

On the ballot, fill in the oval completely but stay inside the lines to make sure your vote counts. Ask for another ballot if you mismark or otherwise spoil the ballot.



For disabled voters or voter who need assistance

- **Curbside voting** - If you cannot walk into a voting site, tell a poll worker that you need curbside voting. A ballot will be brought to your car.
- **Marking the ballot** - The AutoMARK allows disabled voters to mark their own optical-scanning ballots by audio instructions or reading their magnified paper ballots.

Vote Absentee by Mail - Anyone can vote using an Absentee by Mail ballot; no reason is required. Send in your written request for an Absentee by Mail ballot between September 15 and October 28 at 5 PM. Voted absentee ballots must be received at the Board of Elections office by 5 PM, November 3. 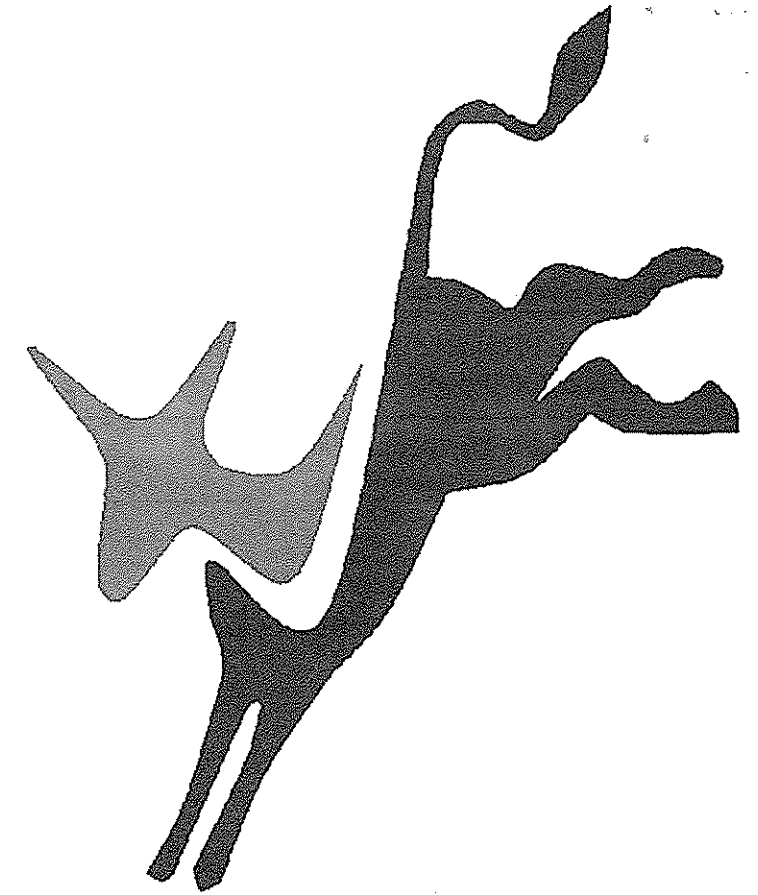
