

Uploading Photos

Uploading photos is usually not difficult. First, you have to have at least one photo stored on your computer, on a CD/DVD or in an external device that can be connected to your computer.

Then go to your Meetup profile and click on the "Photos" tab.

Further down on mine it says, "Upload a new photo and make it your main photo"

Below that is a box and to the right of the box a button with the word "Browse" on it. Click on that button. Now you will need to know enough about computers to know where your photos are. If they are on your computer, it will probably be drive C: and then in a folder - perhaps "My Pictures" or wherever you stored them. If they are on a CD/DVD it will probably be drive D: If they are in an external device, it will need to be connected to the computer and turned on. It will probably be drive E:

After you find the folder with your photos you need to choose one. If you only see the file names of the photos it is helpful to be able to see small versions of the photos in order to choose the correct photo. On the second row of the "File Upload" window the last icon to the right is named "View Menu". Click on it and choose "Thumbnails" and you will see all of your photos. Double click on the photo you want to upload. Then click on the red "Submit" button at the bottom of the screen and it will be uploaded to your profile.

You can then add further photos one at a time if you wish. You can have a main photo for your Meetup profile and choose other photos as the main photo for the various groups you might belong to. Each profile can also have additional photos.

Hopefully this will help you upload some photos so that everybody recognizes you when we next meet. Please use recent photos. One thing many dislike about the online dating sites is that people upload photos from when they were younger and more attractive. Our group was conceived as an alternative to online dating sites and focuses on meeting in person very quickly so photos are not as important. But nonetheless, a person still gets off to a bad start if the initial information in their profile is misleading.
