A Great Vet and a New Technique Makes A Difference

Rachel wasn't that unusual. She was a stray turned over to Sheltie Rescue, so it was no surprise to discover she had malnutrition, brown patches in her black coat from sunburn and/or lack of good food. Her coat was thin and sparse, she was itchy. She walked slowly, with her head hanging down and her eyes were dull and sad, her teeth cried "take me to a dentist", and Rachel was heartworm positive. Fairly normal Sheltie Rescue intake, except for her ear problems. Her ears were in terrifically bad shape - one ear canal was nearly sealed shut at the top. "Here we go again", we thought. A second sheltie is going to require a Total Ear Canal Ablation; and we sighed sadly. Before giving up and scheduling surgery, we took her to Dr. Coral Turman who had recently purchased a video otoscope. This device is essentially an ear scope with a camera attached. The camera sends photos to a computer, so the vet can see right down into the bottom of the ear - quite an advantage in treating long standing ear problems. The scope also allows for a tiny pair of tongs or tweezers to be inserted through it, so impacted gunk at the bottom of the ear can be removed.

As I said, one ear was nearly sealed shut and the other ear opening was extremely narrow; that would prevent us from using the video otoscope. However, Dr. Turman believed there was a small chance that antibiotics, steroids and medication for yeast, combined with an ear fluid with Synotic & Batril in it could get the canal to reopen enough to use the otoscope. It certainly was worth a try!

Dr Turman sent Rachel home with Cephalexin, Prednisone and Ketoconazole plus Malacetic ear fluid- an extremely potent mix. We made up a medication chart and ear cleaning directions, set timers so we wouldn't miss "pill time" and for the next 3 weeks, we medicated and cleansed with downright fanaticism. Since the left ear canal had such a tiny opening, we used a thin syringe to get the Malacetic directly into the ear canals. Things seemed to improve, Rachel looked happier (on-going pain from an ear infection definitely affects one's outlook on life!) and the ear openings seemed to be larger. We held our breath, hoping we weren't just imagining improvements because we wanted to see them so badly.

With great hope and anticipation, Rachel was once again driven to see Dr. Turman. She was put under anesthesia, and - hurrah!! - we had improved the ear canals enough that the scope could be inserted. Here's what Dr. Turman reported when we picked up Rachel that afternoon:

1. The left ear (the worst one) was done first. All the vet techs were observing, since this was a special case and a new technique was being used for the first time. The techs said the image of the ear interior looked like clouds or popcorn - all white and billowy. Using special tiny tongs through the scope, they were able to scrape out LOTS of gunk - probably some yeast, definitely dirt, some impacted hair, all sorts of stuff that had been aggravating that ear canal. They were able to clean down to the eardrum - and Dr Turman said "We could have flushed that ear out until the cows came home, but we would never have been able to get the impacted stuff to move!". A very tiny hole in the eardrum was found. Nothing too bad, but it was a crucial find!! Dr Turman now knew she couldn't use anything in the ear that was ototoxic (causing death to ear tissues). As they cleansed the ear canal, it kept collapsing every time it wasn't full of fluid. Hopefully the new procedure would help strengthen the ear canal as well as clearing up the long term infection.

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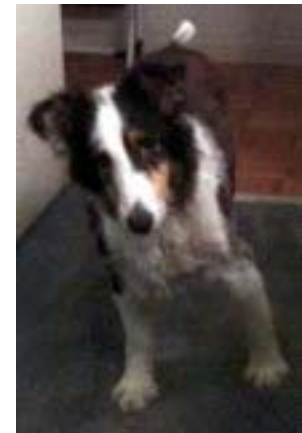

Rachel's story continued

2. After cleaning out the left ear thoroughly, Dr Coral began the new procedure - insertion of an ear wick (like a tiny tampon) that would be used to hold medication in the bottom of the ear for a two week treatment period. All of the crew stared at the tiny piece of tightly packed material rather dubiously - would that actually be able to accomplish anything? The ear wick went in, medication was dripped into the ear and, according to the 'book', the ear wick would swell up - holding the medication against the walls of the ear canal and hopefully strengthening the walls so they wouldn't collapse again.

3. They then cleaned the right ear which wasn't too bad, certainly better the left! There wasn't as much debris in the bottom of that ear and the eardrum looked fine.

4. Back to the left ear again: Because this was the first time Dr. Turman, had used ear wicks, she wanted to be sure she could get the wick out again. She couldn't see the tiny little string with the normal ear scope, but using the special one, she was able to pull out the ear wick with tongs. Just like the picture in the book, the wick had swollen up from absorbing the medication - AND - the interior of the ear canal actually showed an improvement in just the 20 minutes or so it had had the wick in. Relief was felt in the clinic operating room and another wick re-inserted.

5. GOOD NEWS: There was no sign of middle ear disease. If it HAD started, we halted it in its tracks with all the medicines and ear fluids we have been using. Once middle ear disease gets a good hold, it cannot be corrected, so we were lucky there. A delay of even a few weeks might have made it impossible to widen the ear canals enough to have done the procedure.

Rachel went back home with a refill of all the medications, except the ear fluid was changed to a special mixture personally concocted by Dr Turman. This was necessary due to the little hole in the one ear drum, since we couldn't use anything ototoxic anymore. A two week wait and Rachel returned to Dr. Turman again for the moment of truth.

The news after the ear wicks were removed was good!! The tiny hole in the one eardrum was completely healed. The ear canals were not only wider, but stronger and didn't collapse inward any more. Rachel's long term outlook is good as long as her ears are cleaned several times a week and her food allergies are kept under control. To help with that, we had a blood draw done last week so allergy tests could be run. We already know she is allergic to beef and Missing Link (a supplement Sam uses) because when we took those things out of her diet, her itchiness improved.

Rachel, initially the most BORING sheltie Sam has ever known, has made huge strides. She is now active, alert, and so happy. Rachel walked with crouched back legs initially. We think that was because she had been heavily matted while she was a stray and it hurt to walk upright because the hair on her tummy pulled when she tried to stand straight. We have gradually been increasing the length of her daily walks and now she stands upright again, as those muscles had probably atrophied a bit from the days she was a stray.

We are filled with glee to see her like this!! We sometimes forget how much constant pain reduces quality of life, how much good food and a safe, loving home can do. Rachel is one of our senior rescues who is hoping someone will appreciate how much a senior can bring to their lives - they are active without being hyper; house trained, looking for just a warm place to sleep and a little love. In return, they give loyalty and so much gratitude! Rachel is well socialized, friendly to everyone - human or dog and she sure is looking a lot prettier now that her hair is growing back!

Skip our 5 year old who was found by a JSO Officer and his wife in a ditch with a teenager beating him with a club. He broke with grand-mal seizures 3 weeks after coming to us.

Duffy who is 11 and immune compromised.

Tyler who is 13 immune compromised.

Minnie & Cooper who are youngsters maybe 3 years old but completely untouchable.. They are sisters, but will go separately. We are working hard to gain their trust and we have made some inroads with them, but they are no way near ready to go to a home. They're tremendous flight risks. But someday.....

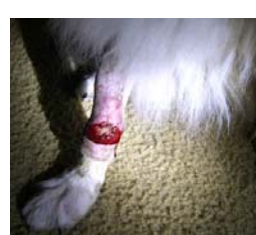

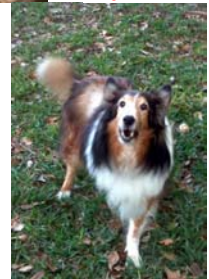
